# **Flooding in the Village**

We have all witnessed recently the ridiculous amount of water that bubbles up from the drains on Massingham Road, flows down Lambert's Lane and then makes its way along the ditches before cascading into Low Street by the ford. Rougham End, despite work having been carried out there some time back, is also still prone to flooding. The PC has been working on your behalf to try and get the problems resolved. Numerous emails have been written to our County Councillor, Mark Kiddle-Morris and our MP, George Freeman. We have tried to organise meetings of engineers and local residents, but to no avail at this stage. As we write, work is scheduled in Low Street between 4 and 10 March. The plan is to pipe the ditch to the north of the ford. Time will tell if this will resolve the problem there.

# Parish Clerk

The Parish Councillors are delighted to report that our previously locum clerk, Mrs Gail Robinson, has now accepted the position of substantive Parish Clerk. Gail came to us highly recommended by the Norfolk Association of Local Councils. She is very experienced having been a Clerk for over 20 years and is very well qualified for the position. We extend a very warm welcome to her.

# The Budget and Grass Cutting

Your Parish Council spent many hours debating the budget for the financial year 2024-25. We were very conscious of the ever increasing cost of living and were keen to avoid an unnecessary increase in the parishioners tax burden, i.e. the precept. We finally arrived at what we believed to be a fair budget that covers all anticipated expenses for the year ahead, sets aside funding for future improvements within the village and builds in a reserve pot to protect our financial situation from the 'unknowns'. It also allowed us to set a precept for the year that is only slightly above what it was in 2023-24, but still marginally less than it was in the three years previous to that. The budget and precept were formally proposed and accepted at the Parish Council Meeting on 30 January. All that said, there is one area of the budget that the Council wants to address and that is the grass cutting costs. We are very fortunate in Weasenham to have lots of green areas and two lovely churchyards, but it all comes at a price. If we set aside for the moment the issue of mole catching, the current grass cutting agreement amounts to almost 32% of the total precept. This isn't too great a burden whilst we are in receipt of annual funding for the Solar Farm, but that isn't guaranteed, so we must identify ways of reducing the costs and safeguarding the village when that funding finally disappears.

The Council will shortly be undertaking a process whereby contractors will be asked to provide quotations for a grass cutting contract, but before finalising such a contract, we want you, the Parishioners, to have your say. To help you articulate your view, we have included a short questionnaire with this Newsletter. Please take a few moments to let us know what you think. You can scan the completed leaflet and email it to any of the Councillors, hand it back to any of the Councillors or drop it in the temporary letterbox that has been placed by the door of the Community Building.

Also, on the reverse of the leaflet, you will find some further space to let us know what you would like to see in the village in the coming years. This is your chance to tell us what **you** want, please take it.

### So what next?

We've got the Community Building and a nice new, well lit path to it. So what is the next project? Obviously, the Council will listen to the community to see what you want. If suggestions are well supported, practical and affordable, we will definitely consider them. In the meantime, our thoughts are that the car park at the Recreation Field would benefit from being levelled out and made less prone to flooding. A floodlight, working in conjunction with the new bollard lights, and lighting up the car park, is also worthy of consideration. What do *you* think?
